

Attractions along the route

Wetherby Town Centre

This historic market town on the banks of the River Wharfe is equidistant from London and Edinburgh and it became an important staging post for mail coaches in the 18th century. Buildings of particular interest are the Town Hall, the Parish Church, the river bridge and The Shambles.

Wetherby Racecourse

The Romans raced Arab horses at Netherby a few miles upstream from Wetherby. In 1891 the first race meeting was held at Wetherby Racecourse. A National Hunt course, it is famous for its jump meetings.

Spofforth Castle

The picturesque ruin of a once fortified manor house belonging to the powerful Percy family dating mainly from the 14th and 15th centuries. Entry to the castle is free and the opening times are:

1 April - 30 September 10am-6pm Mon-Sun

1 October - 20 March 10am-4pm Mon-Sun

Thorp Arch Estate and Retail Park

A large business estate in a parkland setting. It is the North of England home of The British Library and many regional companies. The estate also has a number of home furnishing stores, a garden centre, children's play centre, cafe bar and cycle hire.

Spofforth Castle



In 1992 the disused railway between Spofforth and the outskirts of Wetherby was converted by Harrogate Borough Council into a path for walking and cycling, and in 1993 it was extended into the former railway 'triangle' in Wetherby by Wetherby and District Lions Club (the route being named after the late Peter Harland, Lion President). In 2003 Leeds City Council built the route eastwards from Wetherby to Walton Gates and it was continued by Sustrans and Leeds City Council to the Thorp Arch Estate and Retail Park in 2007, guided by the Wetherby to Thorp Arch Railway Path Forum.



Code of conduct

- Motorbikes and vehicles are not allowed on the cycle paths
- Users should keep to the path (and linking rights of way) and not trespass onto adjacent land.
- Dogs must be kept under close control at all times and should not foul the path.
- Cyclists should be considerate to other users and warn of their approach.
- Shooting and hunting are not allowed.
- Horses are only allowed on the Wetherby to Thorp Arch section.
- Please take your litter home.

When you are on the National Cycle Network you will see these signs, red for National route, blue for Regional route.
